## Saturday 20<sup>th</sup> April 2013 Robin Powell

A lovely spring day saw the return of Robin to Ruishton, in in his usual wellorganised manner he had printed up a programme of the planned music for the afternoon. We began by playing **Byrd's** Lord Willobie's Welcome, a lively little piece which warmed the group up nicely. Following this we split into 2 choirs and got out the larger instruments to play Hassler's Kein Grosser Freud. Robin began by reading the words – which were a 'tribute ' to his wife, Alison, who was sat at the back of the hall – I think that she was suitably embarrassed! After a few issues with the printing of the music (repeats in the wrong place!) we gave a creditable performance of the music, and the 2 choir effect worked well. Before tea we looked at Vivaldi's very beautiful Al Santo Sepulcro – a short sinfonia consisting of a very moving adagio and a lively allegro. Robin had cleverly arranged a descant part as some of the group only play descant, and this worked well. Tea consisted of a cream tea or delicious lemon cake organised by Felicity and Ann. After being fortified (and we needed it!) we played **Paul Clark's** Greek Dances – perhaps not up to speed, but they were certainly enjoyable. The 7/8 movement had particular challenges, but I think the general impression was good. Following this we tried our new 'experiment' – playing the music from the centre pages of the SRP magazine. This was an idea put to the committee – to try to play the SRP music at the following rehearsal, so that people could get a chance to practice one part In advance, and after learning it at the meeting could take the music away to their small group with some knowledge. The piece was entitled Allegretto, and written by a young composer, Daniel Rose-Jones. It had some lovely tunes in, and also some challenges to articulation, and the overall effect was pleasing. We concluded the afternoon by playing through the suite of 5 pieces – Tafel *Musica*- by **Rautavaara**. This is a lovely little suite with interest in all the parts. Thank you Robin, for your patience with the group and the lovely choice of music that you brought along today.
