



Ian Wilson is one of the UK's leading Recorder players. He is the principal recorder professor at the Guildhall School of Music & Drama, the Head of Woodwind at Eton College and is the visiting recorder and clarinet specialist at the North East of Scotland Music School in his hometown of Aberdeen.

In a rich and varied career, he has performed regularly with The Sixteen, English National Opera, The Gabrieli Consort and the Early Opera Company. He is a founding member of the recorder quartet *The Flautadors* with whom he has recorded five highly acclaimed albums. He is musical director and conductor of the Scottish Recorder Orchestra.

As a chamber musician and soloist, Ian has performed in many European festivals including the Auvergne and Innsbruck Early Music Festivals, the Edinburgh Festival, Skálholt Festival in Iceland, and the BBC Proms. Outside classical music, Ian can be heard on albums by Paris Motel and singer-songwriter Vashti Bunyan, and the 2024 Oscar-nominated score for the film *Poor Things*.



Pianist **Libby Burgess** is well-known on concert stages across Britain, playing regularly in the country's major halls and festivals, and on Radio3 as song specialist and chamber musician. Equally respected for her programming skills, she is the founding Artistic Director of New Paths Music, and was also Co-Artistic Director

with Martin Roscoe of the Beverley Chamber Music Festival.

Libby's recent calendar includes song concerts at Wigmore Hall with Alessandro Fisher, Leeds Lieder with Claire Barnett-Jones, Oxford Lieder with Ailish Tynan, and Southwell Festival with Mark Padmore; the complete Beethoven cello sonatas with five different cellists; *The Rite of Spring* with Chris Hopkins; and broadcasts with the BBC Singers.

Libby loves working in contexts that seek to overcome barriers and share the power of music with everyone.
